

# November 2022 BOM - Prairie Points in a Centerpiece

## **Fabric requirements**

Six coordinating fabric choices

One backing fabric 15" x 15"

1 each: 2" x 2" square of any one of the fabrics you have selected

4 each: 3 1/2" x 3 1/2" squares in #1 fabric

8 each: 5" x 5" of fabrics #2, #3 and #4

## **To make your prairie points**

Take your squares and fold them all in half and press (Except for the 2")

Fold the folded sides to the center creating a triangle with a sharp point, press

At this point, all the raw edges should be on the bottom



Attach the 2" square to the middle of the backing fabric with a small amount of glue

Attach the 3 1/2" prairie points to this square, this will cover the backing fabric entirely

Then it is time to layer the 5 1/2" prairie points on top the 3 1/2" prairie points

There are multiple ways of doing this and it is up to you to determine how you would like the fabric to show.

The focal fabric should be the last one to be attached

You will be alternating the placement of the prairie points

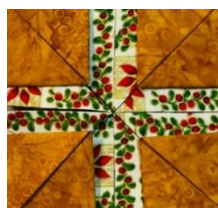

Pic #1: Base with 3 1/2" prairie points

Pic #2: Four prairie points on top of the 3 1/2" points

Pic #3: Four more prairie points layered over

Pic #4: Has 3 layers of prairie points



Continue this way until all your prairie points are all layered. Use glue to hold them together until they are stitched down. Once the points are layered, sew them down to the base fabric with one stitch in the middle of all the points, from edge to the center. This will keep them from falling out or moving. After they are secure, you can determine the shape you want your centerpiece to be, either a round or an octagon. Cut to the shape you decided on. Complete with coordinating bias binding. I decided to do this. I cut out a circle in a coordinating fabric, sniped all the way around the circle for ease of folding in the raw edges, placed over the prairie point center and sewed together with a decorative stitch.
